Number of VA decision appeals granted in favor of the veteran during 2020, thanks to assistance from free American Legion staff claims specialists. Over 75 percent of cases with American Legion representation were ruled in favor of the veteran or sent back for further development or study.



Approximate amount in VA benefits secured for veterans in 2020 using free, accredited American Legion department service officers nationwide and beyond.



Number of American Legion National Emergency Fund grants issued in 2020, amounting to more than \$160,000 in natural disaster relief from Puerto Rico to Tennessee to California.



Approximate number of veterans who received Buddy Checks by Las Vegas American Legion Spirit of Freedom Post 76 between mid-December and mid-January.

Operation Comfort Warriors grants awarded in January, one to purchase an iPad for a Puerto Rico veteran whose medical appointments went virtual due to the COVID-19 pandemic and another for an adjustable bed for a veteran who was injured when he was hit by an underage drunk driver.





Number of Valentine's Day cards and letters sent to U.S. military personnel serving away from home in 2020 from American Legion Post 202 in Newton, Conn. Community members and students write notes in the cards in January, and they are sent in time to arrive for Valentine's Day.



Number of American Legion National Emergency Fund grants issued in January, amounting to \$20,093, to individual members and one post to provide relief after natural disasters.

New York City Police Post 460 is actively engaged in the sorting and distribution process of the packages, which contain hand warmers, lip balm, coffee, candy and handwritten thank you notes.
